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## What is Your Hope for Hope? By Ruling Elder Bob Hornlein for the Session

One of my observations is that every particular visible church changes periodically. Our church has changed its name three times. It has changed its denomination, its Vision Statement, the size of the congregation, style of worship, focus of ministry, and leadership. We, the members, in partnership with our sovereign Lord, are able to accomplish change.

We now stand at a unique cross-road, affording us the opportunity to influence what the new Hope Church will look like. We have asked a number of members during one-on-one conversations, "What should the future Hope Church look like?" Following is a summary of those comments.

Most members are hoping for a young pastor, able to relate well to young growing families and their needs. Most respondents were sensitive to the fact that we are an aging congregation that needs an infusion of young people, and then to minister to the developmental needs of their children. In fact, the spiritual and social nurturing of children is expected to be a major ministry focus of the church. The restoration of the Pioneer Girls and expansion of

the Christian Service Brigade programs were cited as a high priority.

Another major concern is that visitors will see us as warm and welcoming. Some members mentioned that is the way they felt about Hope when they first visited. Participation in small groups and Bible studies were also helpful to establish their strong durable friendships and aid bonding.

Establishing an evangelistic effort was seen as a primary need. A local service-oriented outreach ministry to a distinctive people group or need was suggested as useful to gain favorable recognition and to serve the community around us. Another hope for the future is a strong Missions program with more complete information on the missionaries that we support, as well as participation in summertime youth

mission trips.

The greatest diversity of opinion was the subject of worship music. It varied from a strong endorsement of the present form, to a large worship team using contemporary Christian songs. No one mentioned the need for a pianist, which surprised me.

An improved Website is also seen as an aid to our evangelistic effort. — specifically, a directory including pending activities, regularly scheduled events, and information suggesting vibrancy and life.

During the interviews, I asked for spontaneous responses, without pre-thought or preparation. Therefore, there are lots



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of subjects that were not considered. Hopefully they will be considered by you, the members. When our new pastor arrives, he will be expected to assume a huge, intimidating responsibility among strangers. We can encourage him by proactively dealing with these issues, giving him the assurance of our active support and cooperation.

We encourage you to include this need in your prayers, and to discuss and ponder this subject with each other; and in particular, how you plan to help make this vision a reality.

Nothing is too good for thee to give.


**Infinite is thy might, boundless thy love,**

At our recent congregational meeting, Pastor Jim shared with us several books that he has recommended that the elders read, and, by implication, that we read, too. **Evangelism: Doing Justice and Preaching Grace** is by Harvie Conn, who was professor of missions at Westminster Theological Seminary from 1972 to 1998. The premise of the book is that we are all missionaries to the world, and that evangelism is the coming together of word and deed; it is Show AND Tell! According to Amazon, the book is a “short, quick read.”

Another book that Jim recommends is Tim Keller's **Ministries of Mercy: The Call to the Jericho Road**. A review of the book states: “If there is one book that needs to be read by Reformed churches at this time it is Keller's **Ministries of Mercy**.” The reviewer feels that “compassion is the most credible apologetic” in our post-modern society and that Tim Keller's emphasis on works of mercy is timely.



The third book (series, actually) is the KNOW series, by Justin Holcomb. Jim especially recommended **Know the Creeds and Councils** and **Know the Heretics**. To quote from a review on Amazon of the former: “This accessible overview walks readers through centuries of creeds, councils, catechisms, and confessions—not with a dry focus on dates and places, but with an emphasis on the living tradition of Christian belief and why it matters for our lives today.” **Know the Heretics** is, according to a reviewer, a “clear and informed definition of orthodoxy and heresy” taken with a “strong dose of humility and restraint.”

# Learn God's Word

## As the World-Wide-Web Turns

This story begins many moons ago when I began learning to update the Hope Church web page ([www.hopechurch.us](http://www.hopechurch.us)) with Ells Jenkins. I had done some limited web-page development at home and on my job using HTML, which stands for hyper-text-markup-language, a language once used by most web page browsers (e.g. Internet Explorer) to display and interact with users. I was familiar with 1990's era web pages, but times have changed. I learned that the Hope Church web page was hosted by [www.powweb.com](http://www.powweb.com), which means the files used for the web page are stored on web servers owned or managed by powweb.com, including support for Hope Church emails (e.g. [info@hopechurch.us](mailto:info@hopechurch.us)). However, the web page content (web page text, fonts, images, files, and linking) are manipulated and controlled by Content Management Software (CMS), provided by a different company and web site. The CMS is a tool intended to make creation and updating of web pages much easier and simpler than manually editing HTML files.

The CMS used for the Hope Church web page was becoming outdated and did not support newer versions of Windows. At one point, the Hope Church web page was unable to be updated, necessitating immediate actions for switching to a different CMS and hosting service. Several options were explored, including the creation of a new web page from templates, the use of a web hosting service that provides up-to-date CMS tools and predefined web

pages, and the hiring a company to develop a new web page from scratch. The newest web pages are developed to support access from both desktop computers and mobile devices (e.g. resizable web pages able to be viewed on both platforms), while many complex features are provided that increase community exposure and impact that also reduce the skill level necessary to update and maintain the web page. After considering several options, a quick and relatively low-cost solution was made possible by using a third-party web service specifically designed for and catered to churches (i.e. [www.ekkleisia360.com](http://www.ekkleisia360.com)), which had been used by Grace Church (PCA) in Rochester NY. After review and approval by the session, a new web page effort was underway.

The Hope Church web page was developed in three basic steps: (1) select a theme from several available out-of-the-box designs; (2) provide the developer with a site map and logo based on the current Hope Church web site; and then (3) release the developer to transfer much of the content from the old Hope Church web site to the new web site. Several Hope Church members (Sally Jenkins, Rae Whitehead, Melanie Combs, Jeff Butler, and Jim Farinacci) assisted in selecting the theme, which took into consideration available features that may be utilized in the future. Luke Mailloux helped with creation of the logo before heading off to college. The developer transferred the content while making some adjust-

ments. After a few modifications to make the web site more current, the new web page went live in September 2014. Over several months, additional changes and development of instructions were generated to support web page updates by Hope Church members. The new web page currently supports posting of church activities (events), newsletters, and sermons. Further updates are planned to support Hope Church prayer chain member access to prayer list updates, a gallery for posting pictures from various events, a Blog, and possibly a Church Directory.

At this point, the web page is limited by the number of members willing and able to support on-going update of the web pages. Hope Church members that are even slightly skilled in using a computer and the internet, and are willing to regularly give their time to update parts of the web page, are encouraged to contact Sally Jenkins ([sajenkins@hopechurch.us](mailto:sajenkins@hopechurch.us)) or myself ([webservant@hopechurch.us](mailto:webservant@hopechurch.us)) to express interest in participating in this part of the Hope Church ministry.

The Pastoral Search Committee feels encouraged by what we see God doing in our work. We are encouraged by the support and encouragement that we have received from the congregation. It is exciting to talk to potential candidates about Hope Church! We love telling people that as a congregation we love Jesus and each other and we are committed to each other. We are encouraged by the applicants who have been interested in our pastoral position so far. To date we have received more than 30 applications and have been encouraged and challenged as we have listened to many sermons and spoken with several potential candidates about the work that God is doing in their lives.

Besides being encouraged, where is the Pastoral Search Committee in our process? We have reviewed all of the written information that we have received so far and have narrowed our list of potential candidates to several men who we think would be the best fit for Hope Church. We have spoken with 3 of these potential candidates on the phone to get to know them better and to help them learn about us.

## Extend God's Hope

Taking on a semester abroad during my senior year was a risk that in the end, was well worth it. As a result, I have learned so much about God, myself, and life. **“For I know the plans I have for you, plans to prosper you and not to harm you.” Jeremiah 29:11**

My start was rough and riveting. During the first couple of weeks in Lithuania, I was struggling with intense loneliness and helplessness. For starters, I had been in the company of some very intimidating people for an entire week, immediately following my arrival in Vilnius, one of the bigger cities in Lithuania. I mean, it was hard enough to get my weary jet-lagged body to move to multiple destinations. Once I made it to LCC, the international university where I would spend most of my time, I entered into the unknown, completely unprepared for my conditions. I didn't know that my living conditions would include living on a co-ed floor, or that I would have to share space with 4 other girls, with hardly any private space of my own. And within the first two weeks, I found that my plan to fulfill my internship requirement in order to graduate was backfiring on me. It seemed there was absolutely nothing to lean on, except myself, and I was so tired and frazzled from the changes. When I was finally told officially that an internship was not possible for me during that semester, I broke down mentally and emotionally. It shattered my sense of self, but the pieces were rearranged into something beautiful and wholesome and still very needy. I needed to reintegrate

God in my life, or maybe I really needed to open my eyes to what He was already doing. There He was, knocking on the door to my heart, and I was afraid to let Him back in, fearing that He would turn away after seeing the mess I had made of my life. (I was a great catastrophizer.) I didn't know how to trust Him. In fact, I hadn't really let myself trust Him since I was a child.

And so that was where I needed to start...


**“Oh Lord, my heart is not lifted up; my eyes are not raised too high; I do not occupy myself with things too great and too marvelous for me. But I have calmed and quieted my soul, like a weaned child with its mother; like a weaned child is my soul within me. Oh Israel, hope in the Lord from this time forth and forever more.” Psalm 131**

What are the characteristics of a child? Innocence, purity, simplicity, joy, laughter, just to name a few. Being a child means living free of cares and worries that are out of our control. I was not a child anymore, and I hadn't been since I was 6 years old. Many things were out of my control, and I can see that now. But back then, I thought I had to be responsible for everything and everyone in my life. I put weights on my shoulders that shouldn't have been carried by someone so young and new. Life quickly lost its newness for me. Grief, guilt, shame, and resentment replaced my joy and my will to play. In Lithuania, I re-discovered that newness and I realized that I was secretly waiting for

an opportunity to play. I had been for a very long time.

My roommates for the semester were four wonderful young women from Lithuania and Latvia. Each one brought something new and special to the roommate relationship. Sarune and I played guitar often, while Marija and I would get into deep conversations about psychology. Ieva and I supported each other through encouragement, while Vaida and I confided in each other about our faith journey. We were and still are a family, even though we are now distant from each other. But one of the most important things God taught me through these women was that life with Him was not meant to be all suffering, all baggage, or all pain. There was a time for all that hardship but there was also a time for joy, peace, and play. The next thing He taught me was that through the pain and the joy, we need each other, to weep and to laugh together.

When I first came to Lithuania, I was basically helpless. I didn't know where anything was, I didn't know the language, and I didn't know how to ask for help. The people were intimidating to me, and I didn't feel comfortable leaning on them. But I still had to eat, and I needed supplies to keep myself healthy. The first couple of days were the hardest, because




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I had no food. I had a couple apples and bars of chocolate from orientation, but they were gone fast. Then one day, my roommates invited me to the community kitchen for a meal. When I hesitated, they told me it was no trouble and that I needed to eat something substantial. I think that I agreed because they smiled genuinely when they spoke. When I ate with them at the table, in a circle, I felt ashamed of taking from them, of being a burden. They never treated me like one. They invited me again and again for the rest of the week. I learned to simply accept their gift and pushed away those voices telling me I owed them something. They never asked for anything back. Eventually, I confessed to them that I didn't know where the nearest grocery stores were and that was why I didn't have food for myself. Instead of giving me directions and sending me on my way, they offered to go with me to the store and walk me through the process. I was so relieved and encouraged by their offer. After they took me to the store a few times, I could remember where they were located and I was able to walk there on my own when I needed to. The very first time that I walked to the store on my own and bought groceries, I came back completely ecstatic; it was a small victory, but a victory nonetheless. The other American study abroads had a difficult time celebrating with me, because, well,

they were already traveling to other countries and living independently, and going to the store was really no big deal. But I still celebrated.



When I was back on my feet, getting food for myself and cooking in the kitchen, I decided to invite my roommates to a meal that we would first cook together. I loved to cook with them, to eat with them after it was all done, and to talk about our time together. The best part of it all was that I knew I wasn't obligated; I just wanted to give for the sake of giving. That was a beautiful thing to experience, and it changed how I looked at my relationship with God. I found that it wasn't about me giving back or making up for everything God did for me. It was more about me accepting the gift and putting all my trust in Him. God took care of me all through the semester, and He did it through people. It was an uncomfortable transition to go through, but I have learned to appreciate my growth and to appreciate the fact that I will always be growing. So will others. The wonderful thing about real relationships is that we all grow together.

But back to being a child and rediscovering how to play. I learned to have fun with my roommates, in a wonderfully childish innocent kind of way. I realized that my desire to play was what connected me to children so deeply. On many occasions, my roommates would do creative things like decorate the bathroom area, have pillow fights, or make paper airplanes to throw at each other. We even threw a balloon birthday surprise for my roommate Marija. At 6 am, we all started blowing up colorful balloons, maybe fifty of them, and we covered her bed. When she woke up, she was surrounded by many colorful balloons and began to groggily throw them at us. It was a

blast! I even attempted to skateboard in the hallway of our dorm floor. I was told that students at LCC do this when they are bored. I thought I would give it a try. I wasn't a great skater, but it was fun to be silly and laugh at my own mistakes for a change.

When I was able to take life a little less seriously, I started "training" myself to trust in God. This was a lot harder than it sounded. Basically, my goal was to respond to everything that happened during the semester by saying, "I trust you, God," even when I didn't fully trust Him yet. After some time, saying, "I trust you, God" led to thinking, "I trust you, God." Thinking eventually led to believing. I remember a few times I had gotten lost, in the woods and in the city, and I had felt afraid because I didn't know how to get back and I was alone. I began to walk steadily, repeating my training phrase, "I trust you, God," over and over again, sometimes alternating it with "I don't know where I am" and "I'm lost, God" and especially "Help me find my way home." The song, "Thy Word" came to mind, and I began to sing the lyrics: "Thy Word is a lamp unto my feet and a light unto my path. When I feel afraid, think I've lost my way, still you're there right beside me. Nothing, will I fear as long as you are near. Please be near me to the end."

Needless to say, God got me home. He found me again, when I thought I was lost, and I know now that He will never leave me.
